Ashford - Topography

The district surrounding the little villages of Ashford and Glenealy contains some of the wildest and yet most attractive scenery in the county. Glens and defiles, mountains and hills, sea, pasture and woodlands of the tastefully ornamental demesnes - all unite in a series of romantic settings that have inspired poets, writers and painters of every generation and have been the delight of countless thousands of visitors from all parts of the world.

The celebrated Devil's Glen lies about a mile North West of Ashford. This deep rocky chasm is enclosed on both sides by precipitous craggy cliffs which, with their heavy clothing of trees and shrubs, interspersed with rugged masses of barren rocks, are in themselves an imposing sight. Far down below in its narrow rocky bed, the vartry river, a brawling mountain torrent, rushes seawards between steep banks. On entering at the head of the glen, the river falıs from a height of almost a hundred feet and forms a magnificent cascade before dropping into the "Devils" Punch Bowl", a deep basin in the rock below.

Walks have been constructed at a considerable elevation, and from these and the winding pathways which lead round the glen, some really splendid views are obtained. Midway through the glen, steps lead up to the "View Rock" which commands rare views of the Sugarloaf mountains, the sea and Wicklow town.

The glen is open to pedestrians and motorists, the former being admitted free on weekdays and on paying 2d on Sundays; motor cyclists pay $1 /$, and motorists 2/. every day. Admission tickets are procurable at Ashford business establishments.

There are numerous other glens and mountain hollows in this region and each possesses individual characteristics which excite feelings of awe or pleasurable surprise. Dunran Glen, near Killeskey, is amongst the most notable of these and features, amongst other attractions, several fantastic rock formations. One such formation is the remarkable "Bishop's Rock", so named because of its resemblance to a mitre.

The mountains on the West side contribute appreciably to the scenic grandeur of the locality, and, on every side, the profusion of luxuriant trees and shrubs add colour and variety to the view.

Ashford is 27 miles from Dublin and $3 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from Wicklow and Glenealy is $31 \frac{1}{2}$ and 4 miles distant, respectively.

Apart from the many wild glens and rocky defiles, much of which may be termed waste land, there are considerable tracts of rich agricultural land and some bog in this area. The main geological formations are Cambrian and Lower Silurian. Granite is found in some places and marl is quite frequently met with.

## Mansions etc.

Rosanna: This splendid old mansion stands in extensive grounds a short distance from Ashford and convenient to the romantic Devil's Glen. The house is an example of elegant simplicity in design and lies in a verdant hollow of rich meadowland near the Vartry River. The high slopes on both banks of the river are dotted with luxuriant trees which rank with the finest in the country - the leaves and splendid Spanish Chestnuts being particularly impressive. One enormous Spanish Chestnut has figured in Ripley's famous "Believe It or Not" series and has been dlassified by Professor Henry, celebrated British arborist, as the largest of its kind in Europe.

These lands formed part of the O'Byrnes patrimony up to the time of James I, but was in the possession of Sir Wm. Parsons in 1606. It was let and sub-let to other tenants until 1741 when Richard Tighe, keeper of Records at the Birmingham Tower, Dublin Castle, obtained a 999 years lease of half the estate; he secured a 900 years lease of the remainder in the following year. There was a mill but no residence at that time and to him is accredited the original construction of the present mansion.

It was admidst these beautiful surroundings that the authoress of "Psyche" found inspiration for her exquisite poem. Born in Dublin in October 1772 (her father, the Rev. Wm. Blackford, was Librarian to Marsh's Library, Dublin, for a number of years), Mary Tighe showed early signs of talent and beauty and at an early age she became the centre of attraction at the viceregal court where she frequently visited. In l793, at the age of 2l, she married her cousin, Henry Tighe, Barrister at the Middle Temple, and came to live at Rosanna, her mother's former home. The marriage proved rather unhappy, Mrs Tighe's health failed and she died, a consumptive, in her $38 t h$ year at woodstock, Kilcoole, the home of her brother-in-law; She was buried at Inistioge.

In view of the stir which her poetry created some one and a half centuries agợ surprisingly little is known of Mary Tighe's private life, but a painting by Romney, depicting her as a young and very beautiful woman, hangs in the National Gallery.

Thomas Moore was a close friend of the poetess and a frequent visitor at Rosanna, where it is said that he composed some of his sonnets whilst she set many of them to music. Mrs. Tigheawas an accomplished harpist and until recently, at least, her harp was preserved in the house.

It is believed that the novelist, Maria Edgeworth, wrote one of her popular books at Rosanna.

Paying tribute to the poetic ability of Mrs. Tighe, Sir James Mackintosh said of her poem, "Psyche", that the last three cantos were "of surpassing beauty and beyond all doubt the most faultless series of verses ever produced by a woman". "Psyche" was printed at Rosanna for private circulation.

Rosanna has associations also with John Wesley, who availed himself of the hospitality of the owners when on a visit to Ireland. He addressed over 200 people in the Long Room and the organ on whcih he played on that occasion may still be seen in the house.

The property is now owned by the Corballis family and Mass is celebrated by a Jesuit Father on Sundays in the little private oratory at the house. Neither the demesne nor house is open to the public.

## Mount Usher Gardens

This beautiful gardened demesne lies along the valley of the River Vartry, quite close to Ashford Village. The origin, growth and development of the gardens is traced back through three generations of the Walpole family to Mro Edward Walpole who, in 1868 , procured a lease of the old mill which then existed here - together witmbthe small plot of land, a little over one acre in all. Mr. Walpole cleared the ground of its cabbages and potatoes and planted trees, shrubs and flowers in their place. He transferred his interest in the property to three of his sons seven years later and by gradual stages the little plot was added to and improved.

The Vartry was cleverly utilised to the best possible advantage for the purposes of watering and beautifying the gardens, the old Mill House was replaced by a somewhat larger residence, and pathways and avenues were constructed.

The Walpoles were amongst the first to approve of and put into practice the revolutionary gardening theories of William Robinson who advocated that trees and shrubs be allowed to grow in a more or less natural manner. The expert counsel and assistance of the late Sir Edward Moore, eminent horticulturist, were always at the disposal of these enthusiastic amateurs who readily sought and availed themselves of his expert and friendly advice.

The bridges which span the Vartry afford some attractive views along the river banks where irises, globe flowers and many primula species flourish in the moist soil. These and the Landsome Lysichiton Americanum, with its distinguished yellow spathes, as well as various astilbes and spiraeas, are also found near the edge of the water lily pond. In the shade of the tall alders near the pond many hardy plants and some select trees, plants and shrubs have been ideally grouped. Amongst these are the tree-sizel Acacia dealbata, the crimson-lanterned Tricuspidaria lanceolata, Euonymus Bungeanus, Leptospermum Chapmanni - a mass of deep pink blossom, some fine magnolia specimens and several species of hybrid rhododendroms.

A number of rocky beds near the river accommodate many rock and alpine specialities. A path beyond the rock beds leads to the high-walled nurseries and, further on, a little summerhouse provides a pretty view of the house and river. The lawn, which stretches between here and the house, is planted by Japanese maples including the beautiful pink Coral-bark Maple, and the river banks are fringed with mimulas and primulas.

Choice climbers adorn the walls and the stems and branches of many of the trees.

The wood lies to the south and west of the house and here an almost sub-tropical effect is produced by the luxuriant growth of trees and shrubs which have been allowed to grow together in a natural way without any serious attempt at artificial order. Each plant has been given the most favourable spot in which it might best flourish and amongst the most remarkable specimens, which will command the admiration of the visitor, are the Kauri Pine Agathis, australis, bursaria Spinosa - about 20 feet high and bearing creamy white flowers, Camellia reticulata, Myrting Luma - over 20 feet tall and the rare Chinese holly, Ilex Fargesii.

The Mill Race flows between deep narrow banks which are planted on both sides with a rich assortment of ferns. For the convenient examination of these, a gangway has been laid along the course of the stream, a few inches over the water, and the visitor may walk along this and inspect the novel fernery with ease.

Amidst the countless varieties of trees, plants and shrubs in the Gardens, native plants of New Zealand, Japan, China, Australia and Tasmania, the Americas, Ceylon, Africa, the Himalayas and other far-separated lands thrive luxuriantly in a galaxy of planned confusion wherein some of the most valuable of Irish plants find fitting place. Towering high above the majority of the other trees, a fine assemblage of Eucalyptus trees of varied species, some of them more than one hundred feet high, never fails to excite the interest of the visitor and is one of the outstanding features of the Gardens.

To-have space to permit here, a detailed account of the beautiful Rose Walk and the other charming corners of Mount Usher would be very appropriate, but those who are really interested in such places may be assured at any rate that the Gardens rank with the finest in these islands and are well worthy of a visit.

Mr. E.H. Walpole, grandson of the founder, is the present proprietor and is also an ardent gardening enthusiast. The Gardens are open to the public on weekdays. A charge of ls. per person is made and tickets may be obtained at Messrs. Walpoles (Ireland) Ltd., Suffolk Street, Dublin. The Gardens are closed to visitors on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays.

Historic Houses Ashford.

## Dunran:

Sir Jonah Barrington (1760-1834), one time Judge of the Admiralty, Member of Parliament and author of "Historic Memoirs" (which exposed the corruption of the Union and was re-published as "Rise and Fall of the Irish Nation") resided here for a period. In his "Recollections" he mentions how, shortly after the ' 98 Rising the former owner, Countess Dewager of Mayo, discovered a man in hiding under her bed and immediately left the house. She went to live in England and on her disposing of the property, Barrington secured a cheap purchase. It is of interest to note in connection with Barrington that he was removed from the bench for misappropriation of Court fees, that he voted against the Union and yet was instrumental on behalf of the government in getting another M.P. to vote for the same measure which he publicly condemned and exposed in his writings. He was knighted after the Union and resided in France from l809, dying at Versailles in l834. He had been M.P.for Tuam, Clogher and Banagher.

Dunran has recently been purchased by Mr. Patrick Belton, T.D., Bellevue, Killiney, Co. Dublin, and the spacious mansion is untenanted presently. Ideally situated on a height, the house overlooks the romantic Devil's Glen, the Wicklow hills and, in the immediate foreground, the colourful demesne grounds; on a clear day the eastward view is extended for a great distance over St. George's Channel until, on the far side, Snowdon and other mountain peaks in wales are discernible. An underground passage connects the mansion with the circular, granite-walled gardens which, sheltered by natural protections on the north, east and west, is an effective sun-trap and highly productive in several varieties of sub-tropical plants. Exotic blooms, in deed, are a feature of the garden, and fig trees too bear their fruit in the open without artificial aid. Magnificient rhododendrons grow profuselyythroughout the demesne grounds and add an effect of warm cheerfulness. Wild deer roam at large amongst the woodland and glen of the estate and pheasant, woodcock and other game are plentiful.

An old castle ruin, still in a fair condition, stands within the garden near the house. The castle formerlyybelonged to the 0'Byrnes, chieftains in this district, and, duringithe '98 Rising, a party of insurgents took refuge here for a time.

Visitors will be freely admitted to the grounds on application to the proprietor or to the caretaker at Dunran.

## Glanmore Castle:

This spacious castellated mansion stood on a lofty eminence, adjacent to Nun's Cross, about $l$ mile from Ashford, until its demolition about 1943. It was for about two centuries, the home of the Synge family, members of which, in the course of three hundred years had occupied nine bishoprics, one archbishopric and many other high offices in the Church of Ireland. The Synges were an old Shropshire family, whose original name was Millington, and it is saiddthat the name Synge was conferred by Elizabeth on one member of the family who sang in Her Majesty's choir at the Chapel Royal.

Joseph Holt, Insurrectionist leader of '98, found refuge inthe glens around the Glanmore estate following the Rising Glanmore occupied one of the most choice sites near the opening to the Devil's Glen. Holt had previously been employed for a number of years by Francis Synge as deputy-overseer on the estate.

A great grandson of this Francis Synge, John Hatch Synge, married in 1856, Kathleen Traill of Schull, Co. Cork. The youngest of their four sons, John Millington Synge, was to become famous as the author of several brilliant plays; his most famous works are "Playboy of the Western World" and "Riders to the Sea". J.M. Synge was born near Rathfarnham, Co. Dublin in 1871 and was a frequent visitor to the ancestral home, Glanmore, where he resided at various periods.

The last owner of the property was the late Mr. R.A. Synge, eldest brother of the playwright.

Cronroe House - Now Bel Air Hotel:
Situated about half a mile from Ashford, Cronroe House was once the home of the Casement family and Sir Roger Casement, who was of another branch of the family, paid many visits here. Isaac Ambrose Eccles, a distinguished Shakespearean commentator and publisher of several of Shakespeare's works, also lived at Cronroe where he died in l809. He has been described as "A profound scholar, a perfect gentleman, an ornament to Society".

This large, plain edifice is backed by the "Great Rock of Cronroe", from which extensive views of the surrounding glens and countryside are obtainable.

Hunter's Hotel, Newrathbridge:
This establishment was a celebrated hostelry even more than a century ago and a letter which hangs in the foyer testifies to a visit paid there by Sir Walter Scott, his son-in-law, Mr Lockhart, and their party; the letter, describing their tour in Wicklow, is dated l8th July, l825, and is addressed to Mrs. Lockhart.

## Kiltimon House:

The late Sir Henry O'Neal Segrave, celebrated personality of motor and speed-boat racing fame, was a most distinguished connection of the Segrave family who have long resided here. The house is close to Dunran Castle and the Devil's Glen and is 7 miles from Wicklow.

## Deputies Pass:

$\bar{A}$ bout $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles south west of Glenealy, was built in 1590 , by Sir Wm. Russell, Lord Deputy, in order to connect Wicklow and Rathdrum and thus facilitate the English Armies who were being constantly harrassed in their efforts to conquer this territory by the local Irish Chieftains, most active of whom was Fiach MacHugh O'Byrne.

## Kilnamanagh:

About the end of the 6 th century, a famous monastic school flourished here under the control of St. Eoghan or Eugenius, who became Bishop of Ardstraw and who is now revered as the patron saint of Derry Dioceses. Eoghan was an uncle of St. Kevin, who spent some time in this school of learning and piety and was pressed to succeed his uncle as head of the school when Eoghan removed to the north. St. Kevin declined the honour, however, and returned to a secluded hermitage before founding his Glendalough school.

In this district the ruins of several churches of considerable antiquity arecfound, but their origin and history are generally vague.

## Killiskey Church:

This ruin lies in a now disused burial ground about 2 miles north of Ashford. It would appear to have been erected at an early date for, on the subjection of the area by the British in the l7th century, the Catholics were dispossessed and it was continued in use by the Established Church. On the erection of the new church at Nun's Cross in l8l7, Killiskey was abandoned.

## Trinity Church:

About one mile south of Killiskey it also appears to date back to an early period and, at the blessed well nearby, patterns were held annually until recent years.

Kilmartin, Killoughter, Kilfea and Inchinappa are notable amongst the other religious foundations which flourished in this neighbourhood and many of which have now almost completely disappeared.

## Ballyvolan Castle:

On the lands of Ballyvolan House, near the southern extremity of Ballyvolen Glen, are the scant remains of an ancient Castle in which, it is said, James II found refuge on his flight from the Boyne. Numerous finds have been made near this site, including skeletons and burnt wood, and, in a nearby marl-pit, a large horn containing Elizabethan silver coins - most of these discoveries were made over a century ago.

## McDermott's Castle:

Vestiges of this ancient fortress are found in the mound and fosse at Ballinagran townland, east of Glenealy. There is evidence here of a Square fort, over l00' each side and a remnant of the side wall of the entrance hall is visible on the south side.

Local tradition asserts that it was to this castle that Dermott MacMurrough brought Dervorgilla, the wife of D'Rourke of Buiffne.

At Kilcandra, $\frac{7}{4}$ mile north-west, a large rath, 50 yards in diameter, is said to have contained a church and burial ground of the MacDermott's of the nearby castle.
