The Venue

This exciting exhibition takes place in the beautiful grounds of the Office of Public Works monastic site, Glendalough, County Wicklow. This Early Christian ecclesiastical settlement was founded by St. Kevin in the 6th century. Set in a glaciated valley with two lakes, the monastic remains include a superb round tower, stone churches and decorated crosses.

The Wicklow Heritage Buildings Show 2015 takes place on the lawn adjacent to the OPW Visitor Centre, while the hourly conservation talks take place in the Meeting Room & the Glen Suite at the adjacent Glendalough Hotel (www.glendaloughhotel.com) which is a two minute walk from the traditional building skills exhibition marquee.

Getting there: If driving, parking is available in the Upper Car Park (€4 day rate) and Lower Car Park (no charge) next to the OPW Visitor Centre and at the adjacent Glendalough Hotel (no charge). St. Kevin's Bus Service operates a coach leaving Dawson Street, D.2 (opposite The Mansion House) at 11.30am and returning from Glendalough at 5.30pm on both Sat 19th & Sun 20th September (€20 return) (01 2818119/ www.glendaloughbus.com)

Food: The Glendalough Hotel offers dining opportunities at their Glendasan River Restaurant, and bar food at their Glendalough Tavern, or alternately enjoy food from the hotel's outdoor BBQ. There are also ice cream and hot dog vendors in grounds of the OPW monastic site. The nearby village of Laragh (2 kms) also offers café and restaurant options. 

A weekend of demonstrations and conservation talks will take place in the grounds of the OPW monastic site in Glendalough County Wicklow. Glendalough will become a one-stop destination for owners in need of accurate, impartial and free advice on caring and repairing their heritage buildings.

- Watch over two dozen craftspeople demonstrate key traditional building skills needed for the conservation of old buildings, including sash window repairs; stained glass & fanlight conservation; stone carving; dry stonewall construction; use of lime-based mortars; decorative plasterwork; ironwork; slate roofing; mud wall construction; thatching and furniture and clock restoration.
- Listen to informative and interactive talks on old buildings: their history, maintenance and repair.
- Engage one-to-one with conservation architects, engineers, planners, craftsmen, heritage builders and materials suppliers about the management and care of your old building.
- Gather information on heritage building planning law, insurance, finance and related topics.
- Talk to representatives at the information stands of the: Building Limes Forum; CIF Heritage Contractors Register; Irish Georgian Society; Irish Horological Craft Forum; Wicklow County Council and The Dry Stone Wall Association of Ireland.
